

### Fall Retreat

'Compulsions of the Heart – Something Awful is Happening' was the focus for the weekend retreat at Lutheran Island Camp in August. Sixty-nine women were in attendance on Saturday.

Pastor Seter challenged us to live out our faith by doing acts of Christ-style mercy for those in need. He spoke of his experiences with the African people and how their witness to what they were doing, i.e., telling the good news of Jesus, in some cases risking their lives to do it, filled him with AWE.

He cited II Corinthians 5:14-15 as 'Christian motivation in a nutshell.' <u>"For</u> <u>Christ's love compels us</u>, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for Him who died for them and was raised again."

"Christ died for you so that you can live for Him. You live for Him by living for others. There is a compulsion in the hearts of believers that causes them to 'look to the interest of others.' <u>Acts of mercy</u> may be opportunities for us to get our foot in the door to tell others about Christ, but primarily they function as our response to what we are in God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We do good works because that is what we are in Christ."

Pastor Seter led us in song during the weekend. Many of the songs were ones that he had composed.

Saturday evening we were entertained by the Great Adventure Gospel Band. David and Chris Garms and their seven children are all very talented in singing and playing a variety of instruments. It was wonderful entertainment.

Closing worship was led by Pastor Seter. Parents and children attending other camps that weekend joined us for worship.

A few comments from the survey sheets: Very good topic and presenter. Good fellowship. Thought-provoking Bible study. Challenges me to think outside myself. It was a blessing to me. I like the idea of entertainment on Saturday night – it was great! I haven't been to a retreat for a long time and it was exactly what I needed. The retreat gives me an opportunity to relax and reflect on God's love and blessings, and making and renewing old friendships.

Next year's retreat will be held the weekend of August 13<sup>th</sup> -15<sup>th</sup>, 2010. It's not too early to mark your calendar.

#### **Stamps for Missions**

For many years the Minnesota North District has been collecting stamps to raise money for missions. You can, too! By clipping and sending us your canceled postage stamps or bringing them to any LWML event, we are able to auction them off in batches for sale by weight to collectors and club auctions. Please continue to follow the suggestions on the Stamps for Mission page, ESPECIALLY keeping 1/4 inch or more around any of the stamps you send me. He will take any stamps, even the regular ones for now. If you have any other questions, please contact me. Stamps for Missions Guidelines:

- Do save all foreign stamps.
- Do save all commemorative stamps (larger than standard size).
- Do save all stamps with a value of \$1 or more.
- Do save entire postcards.
- Do not pull, soak, or otherwise take stamps off the paper.
- Do not reglue stamps.
- Do not save torn or creased stamps, or stamps with damaged perforations.
- Do not save stamps on red or green envelopes. (Continued on page 7)

You can save postage by giving sorted stamps to your Regional Vice President at the rallies. She can then pass them on at the quarterly Board of Directors meeting.

Stamps in albums, older postcards and envelopes (from 1930 or earlier) and first day covers should be sent as they are. It is helpful if you can trim and sort the stamps before bringing them to meetings. REMEMBER: Cut the stamps from envelopes with a margin of no less than 1/4 inch around the stamp. This provides a "handling area" for the collector. (Trimmed too closely the stamp may be damaged and become worthless.)

Sort them into separate plastic bags and mark them: Foreign, Commemorative, High Value, Mixed (if you are not sure about a category), Common.

### YOUNG WOMEN CONTINUED

The convention kicked off with a worship service I will not soon forget. President Janice Wendorf began with an introduction. It was Rev. Dr. Warren Schumacher, President of the Northwest District LCMS 1994-2009, who touched my heart and thousands of other sisters and brothers is Christ. He was so passionate his eyes shone and a smile never left his face. His words touched everyone's heart and soul: "Our God Regins". Would you believe they had 30 communion stations set up?

The next days (hours really) were filled with meetings and some amazing, empowering speakers. The meetings were very professional. By-laws were passed, offices filled. The energy was intense, laughter was contagious, and tears were shed. We discussed the mite goal and how we surpassed it. We voted on how to distribute these resources. Because of LWML mites 19 missions will be supported; nineteen - in a time of struggle we reigned because "Our God Reigns!"

We learned to speak up thanks to Dr. Mary Hilgendorf, our Bible study leader. She says "You have to break a few eggs to make an omelet. Speak up! You have something to say!" She paralleled the relationships of Naomi and Ruth as the voice of the 21<sup>st</sup> century. As Ruth mentored Naomi, we too can become mentors to the young women in our congregation. Mary tells us to start small: have a coffee club or provide a meal with childcare. Anyone can be a mentor if only for a moment. Take those moments to influence young moms. Tell them they are not alone and that the Lord is near. Offer patience, an ear, a heart and a message from our Creator. Reach out to all members with the same open heart and hands.

Ruth N. Koch, mental health educator and National Certified Counselor, shared with us her reflection on a journey to a hill top in her life. She reminded us that we will get tired, annoyed, lost, and probably get some blisters, but getting to the top will be worth it. She encouraged us to start planning our next trip, while we're still on one. We all have hills or mountains in our lives. We are reminded that great things happen at the top of these mountains. The Bible illustrates Jesus' mountain-top experiences. We, too, need to keep "Looking to the Hills" to our reigning God for answers, guidance, and peace.

This experience for me could not have been possible without the encouragement, support and love of the women in my own organization.
