

LWML Individual Membership

Individual membership is designed for women who have an interest in the mission and ministry of the LWML organization, but cannot, for a variety of reasons, attend society meetings.

- A woman who is a communicant member of an LCMS congregation with or without a women's group is eligible for membership as an individual. Individual membership is not considered a group or unit, nor does it confer voting privileges at the national level.
- The privilege of vote at zone or district meetings is at the discretion of those organizations and is determined by their bylaws.
- Requests for recognition of membership shall be processed by the LWML district in which the individual resides.
- Individual members can participate in the activities and events of LWML.

"Serve the Lord with Gladness..." Psalm 100:2

- It is the responsibility of the individual to understand the purpose of LWML and support LWML grants and programs. The mites collected by this person are sent in to the district LWML. They would also get a subscription to the official LWML publication.
- Societies or groups shall invite individual members to attend local activities.
- Zones shall include individual members in zone mailings, and encourage them to attend zone functions.

All of the previous information can be found on the LWML website (*lwml.org*) under the "About" heading, "Membership" tab.

As our groups and zones decrease in membership, I encourage every woman to be aware of these individual women who need fellowship and have gifts they can offer in service to the Lord.

Changes for Good

But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To Him be the glory both now and to the day of eternity. (2 Peter 3:18) Aristotle said, "We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, then, is not an act, but a habit."

As Christians, our goal is to keep growing and maturing. According to research, establishing a new habit takes, on average, 21 days. One popular method to build habits is called the 21/90 rule. This rule is simple. Commit to a personal or professional goal for 21 straight days. After three weeks, the pursuit of that goal should have become a habit. Once you've established that habit, continue to do it for another ninety days.

Max Lucado, in his book, *When God Whispers Your Name*, has identified four habits worth establishing.

1 The habit of prayer

In our prayers, we include prayers of thanksgiving, prayers for forgiveness and prayers of intercession for ourselves and others.

2 The habit of study

We are encouraged to regularly study God's Word through Bible study (either privately or in groups) and to read His Word daily.

3 The habit of giving

Because we have received God's grace through Jesus, we glorify God through giving of ourselves in service to others with our time, talents and treasures.

4 The habit of fellowship The importance of true Christian

fellowship is that it reinforces our beliefs and helps us to focus on Christ and His desired goals for us.

Some of us may have mastered some or all of these habits. But it is important to our Christian life that we continue each of them as we strive to become more like Jesus. There are Bible studies, devotions, skits, etc. available on the LWML website to assist us in these habits. Feel free to contact me if you need help locating a resource.

national level of the LWML is "Water and the Word for Rural Schools in Kenya". This project will receive \$80,000 in mite monies over this biennium. We have been blessed in so many ways that we take for granted on a daily basis. Can you imagine not having clean water to drink and needing to travel miles to obtain water as well? That is something that occurs on a regular basis for students in schools and orphanages in Kenya. Thankfully, a process was developed utilizing water harvesting equipment in the form of gutters and tanks. Through this process, children are receiving hand-washing stations and clean water "buckets" in these facilities that are offered through the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kenva, as well as developing good hygiene practices. In addition, pastors desire to share and extend their ministry to the people of this country, and this grant will also help in that way as well.

One last thing please keep in mind that February 15, 2020 is the deadline for any grant proposals that will be considered for our district convention next June. Any grants postmarked after that date will not be considered. We are aware that there are many wonderful grant proposals that will come before this committee, and we would hate to see your proposal discarded if this deadline was not observed. Mission Grant Report

A total amount of \$13,000 in mites for LWML MN North grants was raised this past quarter. The Mission Grant Committee recommended and the BOD approved the payment of grant allocations as follows: \$6,500 for Scholarships for Full-Time Church Work Students; \$2,500 for Sharing Christ With Muslims; \$4,000 for Project 24 Child Care; Christ's Care for Children Kenya. The chart below details the current balance remaining for the 2018-2020 biennium.

What a blessing for our YWRs this will be! However, there are others out there who may be in need of a kind face, and I would like to encourage all of you to be on the lookout for newcomers in your area. I know that we don't all live in college towns, but those who do - reach out to new college students in town. Invite them to church. Welcome them. Help ease the transition for them from home to college.

Yes, we have some wonderful campus ministries, but some college students prefer to attend church off campus.
