I had chosen my major in college so I would not have to take a public speaking class. Now I am leading Bible studies as a Christian Life representative. God works in mysterious ways!


I know that no matter what my situation is, one of the other women has been there and will be able to help me through with love and understanding.

Seltz were conducting a one-on-one Q&A time.

"Helping Blind and Visually-Impaired People See Jesus"

Mission Grant #9: Production of Audiocassette Materials - Lutheran Blind Mission - \$4,000.

More than 55 million people in the world today are blind. In the United States alone, there are 12 million blind and visually-impaired children and adults. Of those 12 million people, 95% are unchurched, 50% are under the age of 65, 70% are unemployed, 60% are single and

isolated, and 82% do not read braille.

Setting a goal to reach more blind people by the "blind leading the blind" is a clear witness of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Blind people trust other blind people because they know and understand firsthand the issues and problems confronting them. The production of audiocassette magazines enables blind and visually-impaired people to read, hear, and share the light of salvation seen through the cross of Jesus. The six magazines that Lutheran Blind Mission produces are In His Hands-The Blind Mission Society Newsletter, The Lutheran Digest, Lutheran Messenger for the Blind, The Lutheran Witness, Lutheran Woman's Quarterly (aka LWML Quarterly), and Portals of Prayer. The Lutheran Blind Mission duplicates over 11,000 audio-cassette tapes annually through the dedicated efforts of many volunteers.

We would like to thank all of those who applied for the "Go! Share Jesus! Grant." There were five responses. The recipient will be announced in July.

 - Women: socks, stick deodorant, hand or body cream, toothbrush, bar of soap.
 - Children: socks, box of 8 crayons, safety scissors, Christian coloring book, Christian story book, toothbrush.

Out of Darkness into His Wonderful Light

It is a dark, moonless night. As I am walking, I trip and fall. The shadows seem to hide anything that is 'out there.' I imagine animals or the boogeyman waiting to get me, so I turn on my flashlight. That helps. I can now see the path in front of me so I no longer trip and fall. Yet I am still frightened

of what could be in the shadows.

The next day I walk the same path. I laugh when I see what caused the shadows that frightened me last night.

Life is like that. We wander around in the dark – often straying off the path, stumbling over everything. But God has "rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son He loves (Colossians 1:13 NIV)." How did God rescue us? By sending His Son into the world to die for our sins. We are now "a chosen people ... a holy nation, a people belonging to God, that we may declare the praises of him who called us out of darkness into His wonderful light (I Peter 2:9 NIV ©1984)."

When we study God's Word, it keeps us from stumbling over life's obstacles by warning us. The Bible shows the right path and helps us to avoid obstacles:

- "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path (Psalm 119:105)."

- "We have the word of the prophets made more certain, and you will do well to pay attention to it as to a light shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts (II Peter 1:19 NIV ©1984)."

As we keep studying, more and more of God's will and plan for us are revealed through the Scriptures. It is like the sunrise. As the day approaches, we see more of the world around us. The shadows start to disappear. "*The unfolding of your words gives light; it gives understanding to the simple* (Psalm 119:130 NIV)."


When we go through the dark times of life, such as sickness, death, divorce, and financial problems, it becomes difficult to see very well. We become frightened of the shadows. Yet we have a flashlight, God's Word. We can wave that light into the heavens and ask, "Where are you, God?" Or we can shine the light toward our feet, and God will show us, one step at a time, where to go. Plus, He will walk beside us every step of the way. He has promised never to leave us nor forsake us in Deuteronomy 31:6.

There are many people struggling in the darkness without any light. Jesus told us that we are "*the light* of the world" and to let our "*light shine before* others" (Matthew 5:14 and 16). Let's be the light to those in darkness as God has directed us.

Will we ever see fully in this life? No, but through the help of the Holy Spirit and God's Word we can see as much as we need for today.

- While cleaning don't throw out your copy of the <u>Ten Commandments for Leaders</u>:
- 1. Thou shalt know the facts. Be a walking encyclopedia of current and future LWML activities on the society, zone, district and national level.
- 2. **Thou shalt not procrastinate.** Give thyself ample time to handle all matters in an orderly fashion. Do not assume anything: check and double check each step of the way to a successful completion.
- 3. Thou shalt not dominate thy meetings. Though thou be a leader, do not become overly proud of thyself and bore others with lengthy speeches and endless preaching. Unless thou can tell jokes well, do not subject the people to thy dull wit and wisdom.
- 4. **Thou shalt read all thy mail promptly.** Do not store unopened mail on the shelf, expecting to take care of it at a later date. Thou may be missing out on urgent business that requires immediate attention.

- 5. Thou shalt keep harmony with the organization. Do not allow jealousy or hurt feelings to grow. Remind others of their Christian sisterhood and encourage them to show love and kindness to all.
- 6. **Thou shalt distribute materials promptly.** Make sure each member receives national and district publications on time. Make additional copies for those women in your church who have not yet joined LWML.
- 7. Thou shalt constantly look for ways to improve yourself and the organization. Use resources offered by LWML.
 - Attend leader development seminars, read books and listen to tapes that will aid you.
 - Evaluate the activities to see if they are helping to meet your goals. Retain that which is good. Discard that which is ineffective. Do not continue an activity just because it has been done for years.
- 8. Thou shalt start and end thy meetings on time. Be punctual thyself and set a good example for others. Show thy enthusiasm and joy in working for the Lord so that others will be begging to take thy office next year.
- 9. Thou shalt remember to thank members. Praise and compliment the members who have served on committees and projects. Do not miss an opportunity to recognize a member's contribution.
- 10. **Thou shalt remember to thank the Lord.** Thank Him for all the assistance He has given you and for exposing all those hidden talents you never realized you had until you became a leader in the LWML.

Servants of God: Pastor, Teacher, Deaconess

In the last issue of the *Minnesota Northern Light*, I shared information on the career of the lay minister. In this issue we will take a look at the careers of pastor, teacher and deaconess.

A pastor is considered both shepherd and servant of God's flock. On a daily basis,

God will carry out His most wonderful work of saving the lost through the pastor. In caring for the members of a congregation, he is active in preaching, teaching, administering the Sacraments, visiting members, comforting the sorrowing, giving godly counsel, and providing a vision of outreach. He may also serve as a military or institutional chaplain, missionary, a church administrator, an educator, or a campus pastor. Pre-seminary programs are available at Ann Arbor, Austin, Bronxville, Irvine, Mequon, Portland, River Forest, St. Paul, and Seward. Seminary training is through Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri, or Concordia Theological Seminary, Ft. Wayne, Indiana.

If you have a passion for working with students in a Christian setting, teaching is the vocation for you. A teacher will help each student reach his/her potential, while integrating faith into their learning. A teacher will partner with pastors and parents in the joy of preparing students for a life of service to the Church and the world. As a teacher, you will also be able to utilize your gifts and talents in coaching, music, drama, art, or other educational arenas. Education certification programs are available on all ten of our campuses.

Deaconess means "servant." As a Christian woman in the role of deaconess, you will share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through acts of human care and mercy. This may include visiting the sick and homebound, teaching Bible studies, or working with individuals with special needs. Deaconesses serve in congregations, hospitals and other institutions, inner cities and foreign mission fields. Pre-deaconess programs are available at Ann Arbor, Bronxville, Irvine, St. Paul, and Seward. Both undergraduate and graduate deaconess programming is available at Concordia University, Chicago.

The women of the LWML Minnesota North District stand ready to help you achieve your goals. Two mission grant proposals for scholarships were accepted at the 2010 district convention in Alexandria: \$55,000 for Full-time Church Work Students, and \$10,000 for Men Preparing for Ordination. Go to our website at *www.lwmlmnn.org/scholarships* for contact information for our LCMS Seminaries, as well as for the Concordia University System. You can also obtain the necessary scholarship application forms there. Applications need to be received by May 15, 2011.

to keep them together, but <u>do not change</u> the <u>constitution</u>. The national LWML has the constitution.

When we became societies of the LWML, we formed our bylaws and standing rules. [An example of how to view this: We are like a franchise; the parent company (LWML) has the articles of incorporation, and then there are franchise rules.]

If your congregation had a society of ladies prior to joining the national LWML, then you would have a constitution for that and would list that constitution date (for example: St. John's Ladies Aid, 1910.) Then if you know the date your ladies joined the LWML, put that date under the first date (St. John's Ladies Aid, 1948). The national LWML was organized in 1942.

Watch for the national bylaw changes that will be voted on at the LWML convention in Peoria in June 2011. See you there.
