

Who Pushed Me?

Courage. I recently heard a story about an older man who demonstrated great bravery on a cruise ship. Early in the morning, he witnessed a young woman fall overboard into the cold, dark waters below. Within seconds, he was by her side and holding her up. His courage saved the young woman's life, and he became an instant hero. While at a celebratory dinner that evening, everyone on the ship praised him for his courage and asked him to say a few words. Somewhat embarrassed, he slowly approached the microphone, looked at the admiring crowd, and said, "I only have one question. Who pushed me?"

His question implied that he didn't feel brave at that moment. Sometimes we need a push to move us out of our comfort zone. Like him, we must do all we can to help others despite our feelings. Fortunately, God prepares His children to live courageously by giving us promises, people, and problems to push us.

Promises. Feeling brave in a world filled with uncertainty, conflict, and danger can be challenging, so we must turn to the truth. Scripture is a lifeline that holds us up and gives us hope, comfort, and courage. When our Heavenly Father trusts us with an assignment that pushes us to be fearless, we must not trust our feelings but His promises. When we step out in faith, our courage grows when we remember that the Lord our God is with us wherever we go.

People. First Thessalonians 5:11 says we are to encourage one another and build each other up. Using our words to encourage others means that

we are adding courage to someone to help them be confident and unafraid. In the Bible, we see a beautiful example of this in Hezekiah 32:8 when the king countered the enemy's lies by speaking words of truth over all those who "didn't feel brave" when he said, "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or dismayed before the king of Assyria and all the horde that is with him, for there are more with us than with him. With him is an arm of flesh, but with us is the Lord our God, to help us and to fight our battles. And the people took confidence from the words of Hezekiah, king of Judah."

Problems. While walking through this life, we will encounter problems that will push us to grow physically, spiritually, and mentally. Problems change our direction and guide us in ways we may not understand at the time. In the Old Testament, Joseph may have been frightened when he was sold into slavery by his brothers and later sent to prison for a crime he didn't commit. However, every situation he encountered pushed and prepared him for a future God had planned for him. His faith in God's timing and methods led him to a place of power, courage, and purpose when God used him to save many lives, including his whole family. In forgiveness, he later comforted his brothers when he declared, "As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many people should be kept alive, as they are today" (Genesis 50:20). God's purposes always prevail. Knowing this, let's be thankful for promises, people, and problems that push us for a purpose.

Convention Reminders

As we inch closer to convention, I would like to remind you of some common courtesies and orders with which to conduct business during the LWML MN North District Convention.

Delegate Orientation (Monday, June 3 from 12:30 p.m. - 1:00 p.m.) All delegates are required to attend!

Convention Offerings will be taken at the doors to the Main Convention Hall at the following times.

Convention Offering #1: (7:00 p.m. Monday, June 3) At the entrance to Opening Worship

Convention Offering #2: (1:00 p.m. Tuesday, June 4) At the entrance to Convention Meeting #2

Convention Offering #3: (8:00 a.m. Wednesday, June 5) At the entrance to Convention Meeting #3

Speakers

- a. Please give yourself ample time to reach the stage. There will be seats available next to the stage so you can participate in the presentations before you. Speakers are to be seated next to the stage when there are at least two presentations ahead of you.
- At the time of your presentation, please wait at the microphone. The Convention Tech will adjust the levels.
- You must have permission from the Chair to speak.
 Once acknowledged, say "Madam President." c.i.
 The president of the assembly will address you.
- d. Please speak directly into the microphone for the best sound quality. Before you speak, adjust the height of the microphone if needed.

Assembly

- a. Be courteous. Do not raise your voice if you can't hear the speaker. The Convention Tech has control of the microphone volume and will adjust it accordingly. This process takes a few seconds to do. Please be patient.
- b. If you would like to address the assembly, proceed to the nearest microphone located in the aisles.
 Delegates will have priority to speak, unless otherwise designated. You may speak once. If you have another point to address, you must wait until all others are heard.
- c. To speak, you must have permission from the Chair. To do this, stand by the microphone located in the aisle and wait to be recognized. Once acknowledged, say "Madam President."

Young Women at Convention



Fleece blankets – Single layer, woven edge. Fleece will need cutting and weaving. The blankets will be donated to Perham 180, which provide transitional housing for recovering individuals and to a shelter in the Detroit Lakes area.



Fabric eyeglass cases – Simple sewing on a machine. We will be providing a few sewing machines to use. We will provide plug in space if you wish to bring your own machine. These cases are then donated to MOST Ministries

Witness bracelets – Stringing beads in the correct order on leather lacing.

These bracelets are donated to MOST Ministries who coordinate Short Term Mission Trips where they distribute eyeglasses and tell the story of Jesus.

2024-2026 Proposed Mission Grants

The following Mission Grant proposals have met the criteria of the LWML MN North District Bylaws and were selected by the Mission Grants Committee to appear on the ballot. Submitted by the Mission Grants Committee: Marcia Wittenburg (Chairman), Glenice Hall, Mary Ann Bell and Rev. Mathew Vrudny Pastoral Counselor

Grant A – Scholarships for Men Preparing for Ordination – \$8,000 The Lord has blessed the LWML MN North District with the ability to raise money for many missions. This particular mission provides unending benefits. Through God's grace and power seminarians become pastors. Pastors provide the Gifts of the Spirit through Word and Sacrament in the congregation. Anything we can do to help men to become faithful ministers of God's Word is a blessed mission. There are no other funding sources for this grant. The LCMS Minnesota District also has a grant for seminarians of the district.

Grant B – Scholarships for Full Time Church
Workers – \$32,000 The Lord has blessed the
LWML MN North District with the ability to raise
money for many missions. Through God's grace and
power, the students receiving this grant shall serve
the Lord and His people with love and faithfulness to
the Gospel in the ways they were taught for the
benefit of all. There are no other funding sources for
this grant. The LCMS Minnesota District also has a
grant for church-worker students of the district.

Grant C – C.R.O.S.S. Appeal – \$20,000.00 This grant will provide on-going support and financial support for the Lutheran Schools in the LCMS Minnesota North District. Our children are the future of our church. If we do not teach them a firm foundation they could tend to wander away from the faith. If we are to have future Pastors and Christian Educators we must start with their primary education. Congregations throughout the Minnesota North District contribute to the support of our LCMS schools in varying amounts.

Grant D – DOXOLOGY – Pastoral Care and Well being – \$15,000 Pastors report a critical need for sharpening pastoral competencies, and a desire to receive specialized advanced training in the areas for counseling and spiritual care. District Presidents

report that services of this nature, related to enhancing pastoral wellness, are desperately needed but not readily available. Multiple recent surveys document serious levels of depression. demoralization, and ineffectiveness among many clergy. Surveys also document grave misunderstandings between pastors and their people, and the parish suffers. The lay leadership struggles and the congregation loses vitality and the capacity for outreach. Pastors completing the DOXOLOGY program report enhancements of effectiveness, joy in ministry, enhanced relationships with laity and renewed zeal for the work God has given them to do. This grant allows pastors to finance enrollment. Each pastor's enrollment in DOXOLOGY Classic program for 2023 is already underwritten in the amount of \$3,500 contributed by the LCMS and two other funding partners. The remaining cost of \$2,500.00/per pastor is paid by the congregation.

Grant E – Good Shepherd Lutheran High School – \$9,840 Grant to Good Shepherd Lutheran High

- \$9,840 Grant to Good Shepherd Lutheran High School for \$9,840 to purchase interactive boards and personal readers for students. This will assist the teachers in encouraging the students as they learn and grow in their faith in Jesus. Using an interactive board and personal readers encourages our students to learn in a way that works best for them. There are no other funding sources for this grant.

Grant F – Immanuel Lutheran School, Walker, MN – \$10,000.00 Immanuel Lutheran School exists in order to provide a quality Biblical Lutheran education for students and an inviting church atmosphere for their families. Many families find it difficult to afford a Christian education for their children. Immanuel Lutheran School strives to keep our tuition levels low, while still providing a fitting wage for our teachers and aides, as well as a well maintained building space. As we are expanding our

building to make room for additional students, we want to encourage those families by providing them tuition assistance. We pray that the Lord of the Church will bless our efforts in this part of His Gospel mission. Our tuition assistance program receives money from occasional memorials and activity fundraisers. At times, Redeemer Lutheran Foundation money is received and applied to this part of the budget. The amount fluctuates each year, but our current goal is to have \$13,000 available. To help more students attend our school, we are in need of another source.

Grant G - Shepherds Canyon Retreat -\$10,000.00 Shepherd's Canyon Retreat receives \$80,000 in support from the LCMS and varying amounts from LCMS districts, but more is needed. especially since Shepherd's Canyon is now serving 40% more ministry workers than in past years. Since the ministry reaches church workers in every state and district, applications are being made to about 30 other LWML districts for an average of about \$5,000 per district, for total of \$150,000. Shepherd's Canyon Retreat is an LCMS RSO (Recognized Service Organization) that provides week-long counseling retreats. It helps hundreds of ministry workers in various stages of burnout, stress, depression, compassion fatigue, and conflicts. 10% of churches in the LCMS are vacant. It costs hundreds of thousands of dollars to train new pastors. Keeping church workers healthy, helps them stay in ministry. LWML mites would be used to give scholarships to pastors, teachers, DCEs, ministry workers, and spouses to attend a Shepherd's Canyon Retreat.

Grant H – Lutheran Heritage Foundation – Providing Hmong Lutheran Books – \$8500.00 More than 90,000 Hmong immigrants now make Minnesota their home, and LCMS missions are taking bold steps to share the Gospel with these people who came from Southeast Asia and tend to hold on to their animistic beliefs (ancestor worship). With the help of the LWML Minnesota North District, the Lutheran Heritage Foundation stands ready to help by translating and printing books like the Small Catechism, A Child's Garden of Bible Stories, and God's Word for You into two different Hmong

dialects. At a cost of less than \$5 per book, this grant will provide nearly 2,000 Lutheran Bible books for ministries at about a half-dozen Minnesota congregations with Hmong worship services, as well as for LCMS Minnesota South District outreach to Hmong families. Hmong parents and grandparents are eager for these free books, because it gives them the resource they need to teach their native language to the children. As they read the Hmong Bible books aloud, they are reading and sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ! To date, no other funds have been secured for this project. Any shortfall of funds will be covered by the LHF General Fund (individual gifts from churches and donors).

Grant I – Physical Wellness for At – Risk Children - Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch -\$15,000.00 Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch helps atrisk children and their families succeed in the name of Christ. A gift from the LWML Minnesota North District will help make that mission a reality. Mites from the LWML Minnesota North District will be used to transform the gym space on our Minot campus. By partnering with the Ranch, the women of the LWML will play a direct role in creating a safe, wellness-focused environment where children can learn, grow, and build healthy habits. No other funds have been secured at this time. Additional funding will be solicited as necessary from the Ranch's generous donor base and from other LWML groups across the country.

Grant J – Worker wellness for Chaplain Families - \$10,000.00 The LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces supports LCMS chaplains who represent the church on active duty, the reserves, the national Guard, Civil Air Patrol, Coast Guard Auxiliary, and VA Chaplains meeting the needs of God's people (military personnel and their families) where needed most and who serve in the vocation as members of our Armed Forces; and Church Worker retreats focus on the unique challenges of military chaplaincy, helping the Chaplains and their families feel connected to their Church body, network with other Chaplains, focused on teaching God's kingdom workers to care for themselves and their families, provides much needed resources and training to ensure they are spiritually fit, mentally

tough, and emotionally resilient, so they can continue to bring the gifts of God to those who selflessly serve our Nation in the Armed Forces serve; and The Department of Defense does not cover costs for spouses or children making it financially challenging for families to attend Wellness Retreats. The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's (LCMS) Ministry to the Armed Forces (MAF) is authorized as the mission arm of the Synod to support and serve all military chaplains – active and reserve – their families and the veteran population.

Grant K – St. Paul's Lutheran School, Perham, MN – \$17,127 At its core, the mission of St. Paul's Lutheran School is about sharing and spreading the love of Jesus, and by doing so, living out the Great Commission. Each child leaves St. Paul's Lutheran School having been taught again and again that Jesus Christ is their Lord and Savior and died on the cross for their sins.

The existing children and youth (preschool - 8th grade) will benefit through retention efforts.

Potentially any child residing in the Perham – Dent School District in or going into preschool - 8th grade could benefit from this grant. The goal of the grant is not only to retain existing students, but also impact the lives of other students in the area currently receiving education elsewhere. St. Paul's Lutheran school does not have another funding source for this grant. St. Paul's Lutheran school is seeking funds to provide a variety of marketing materials to better retain and recruit families.

Grant L – Swaddling Clothes – Redeemer,
Aurora, MN – \$15,000 The Ladies' Guild of
Redeemer Lutheran, Aurora, is seeking funding in
support of Swaddling Clothes, a mission and
outreach effort of the Guild and congregation since
2019. Swaddling Clothes is a program which
provides for the free distribution of items necessary
for the care and support of newborns, babies, and
infants. Swaddling Clothes serves families
throughout the Iron Range by providing basic needs
for child care such as diapers, car seats, clothing,
etc. In the past year [Jan – Dec 2023] 547 families
utilized Swaddling Clothes, an almost five – fold

increase in use since 2021. Most users [estimated at 60 per cent] have no church affiliation. Swaddling Clothes demonstrates the love of God through Christ in this mission of mercy and outreach to s Funding sources for the year 2023: LWML MNN grant, LCMS Million Dollar Life Match Grant Volunteer fund raisers, Gloria Dei Lutheran Church Christmas gift, Redeemer Lutheran Church Council gift per year, Redeemer Lutheran Parishioner contributions, Occasionally Thrivent cards are used by members for the purchase of needed items to support Swaddling Clothes.

Grant M – Textbooks and Uniforms for Haitian Children, LMA - \$10,000 Lutheran schools in northern Haiti have been growing with over 1,400 children currently enrolled. Because of the poverty in the country, purchasing textbooks and uniforms are difficult if not impossible for families of the students. This grant would help the students and teachers facilitate more effective learning methods. Though this grant would not be able to meet all the needs, it would have an effective impact. (The Lutheran Mission Association has a safe means of getting the money to Haiti and a responsible and accountable pastor, Rev. Eliona Bernard, to process the funding. Members of LMA regularly visit Haiti and verify that the funding is being spent as intended.) There are no other funding sources for this grant.

- \$5,000 At this time there are three pastors in the northern part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Haiti. Because of the remoteness and ruggedness of the region, transportation is difficult. Motorbikes would greatly help these pastors and allow them to minister more effectively in their congregations and schools. (The Lutheran Mission Association has a safe means of getting the money to Haiti and a responsible and accountable pastor (Eliona

Bernard) to oversee the purchase of the motorbikes.

Members of the LMA regularly visit Haiti and verify

that the funding is being used as intended.) There

are no other funding sources for this grant.

Grant N – Motorbikes for Haitian Pastors – LMA

Grant O – Comfort Dog Ministry – First Lutheran Church, Grand Rapids – \$20,000.00 We are asking for \$20,000 to fund the startup and first year ministry of a comfort dog from Lutheran Church Charities. These dogs are highly trained to be used in situations where a person is in distress or needs comfort. The people of First Lutheran – Grand Rapids believes the addition of a comfort dog to their congregation would enrich their outreach to their community.

Startup funds we are asking for from LWML: \$20,000 Partial cost of acquiring the dog. Other expenses: veterinary per year \$500 – \$1,000 per year, Grooming by a professional groomer (required by LCC) \$1,000 Food and other necessities annually \$500 other necessities like business cards \$1,000. Travel expenses for training by the top dog and the team handlers \$2,500. Additional funding is from First Lutheran, United Way of 1000 Lakes, Thrivent, and individual contributions.
