2014 District Convention Highlights

Keynote Speaker - Rev. Paul Krueger

On Tuesday June 24, 2014, at 11:00 a.m. I was privileged to hear Rev. Krueger speak about Hope Village and the work that has been and continues to be done in Minot, North Dakota. The story of the work that Our Savior Lutheran Church and eventually nine other faith-based response agencies, state, local and national government agencies did is awe inspiring. The work that Rev. Krueger and all the members of Our Savior Lutheran Church reflected the mercy of Christ by coordinating the efforts of more than 5,800 volunteers from forty-two states into helping more than 1,200 families recover from the tragedy of the flood.

But his presentation about the founding and work of Hope Village wasn't just about that disaster response; it was a presentation that told us in Pastor's Krueger's words that, "God's answer to the tragedies of a sin-broken world is not to run or even remain neutral when faced with human sorrow. Instead, in mercy God incarnates Himself with at the very center of the world's brokenness and to infect sin's darkness with rays of hope. Likewise, the missional nature of Christ's church calls for God's people to do the very same in every time of human need. God's answer to the cries of hurting people might be you?"

As Hope Village's work continues in Minot it is now changing its name to HOPE BUILDERS. Hope Builders will act as a regional disaster hub and will be able to assist in other disasters as they occur, continuing to reflect God's love and mercy to others and allowing God's people to continue to answer the prayers of the needy.

Bible Study with Pastor Brady Finnern

Convention verse: *"For God alone my soul waits in silence; from Him comes my salvation. He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall not be greatly shaken."* Psalm 62:1-2 (ESV)

Tuesday morning Bible study began with singing "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less." The refrain says "On Christ the solid rock I stand." Pastor Finnern asserted that Christ is our rock; we will not be greatly shaken.

Pastor explained the background of Psalm 62. This Psalm was written by David. We do not know the historical context, but the hint of weakness may indicate it was towards the end of his life. Psalm 62 is a Psalm of confidence in the Lord and not in oneself.

Pastor Finnern gave us three statements to remember:

- God is my Salvation.
- God is my Rock and Fortress.
- That Rock is Christ.



Wednesday morning Pastor reviewed the above statements. He told us to keep it simple. We have eternal life through Jesus (John 10:28). Nothing will separate us from Christ (Romans 8:31, 35-39). We don't have to do anything to earn salvation (Colossians 2:13-14).

Pastor went on to tell us how to keep it simple. Receive the gifts of Baptism, peace, and forgiveness through worship. Pray. Read your Bible. Go home and serve.

Bible study concluded with singing "The Church's One Foundation."

Breakout Session Highlights

The first session began at 1:00 p.m. and the second at 2:30p.m. When asked about the different sessions, some of the 250 plus participants said they found the breakout sessions they had attended were enjoyable, interesting, inspiring, educational and thought provoking.

In the following paragraphs you can read about some of the highlights from each session by one of your LWML sisters.

Session A – Kim Wagner

"Joy On The Journey"

Breakout speaker, Kim Wagner presented **"Joy of the Journey"** by sharing her joy from her journey. Kim is a very down to earth, captivating, and wise speaker enabling us to engage in our five senses throughout the telling of her journey. It was a challenging task set before us regarding life itself and then add something like stage 4 breast cancer, or other life events. The audience a group of people longing for meaning and beauty in a world that doesn't often make sense she encouraged us to find joy and celebrate every day we are given, to acknowledge, that all life is an incredible gift/blessing and how we can find God in all situations. To top it off she gave us a pleasant reminder that God does have a sense of humor as she beautifully interwove humorous true life stories and conversations that she has experienced along her journey. Experiences and stories we all can relate to. Meaning and beauty suddenly showed up in God's love and it transcended everything.

Session B Geneva Paulson

"Rescuing Randy"

Geneva Paulson presented a moving story on rescuing her son Randy (who was formally in the Navy) from a cult. Lloyd Ray Davis started a group (cult) called First Christian Fellowship. He targeted sailors and was so charismatic that young men were drawn to him as they felt they belonged to and were loved by him.

The Paulson family were mentored by others who had gone through the same thing and they were eventually able to kidnap their son and deprogram him. Randy is now a devout Christian and has a hard time believing he was involved with that group.

Davis was eventually tried, convicted, and sentenced to 31 years in prison, he, however, died in prison before serving out his term.

Session E - CLEF

Confessional Lutheran
Education Foundation

Rev. John Fehrmann opened the session with a brief history of CLEF (Confessional Lutheran Education Foundation) and then continued with describing the numerous projects CLEF is working on today. A project list for 2013-2014 listed the current projects CLEF is working on in Asia, Africa, Central America, North America, South America, and World Wide. CLEF's work on the International Lutheran Hymnal and The International Lutheran Electronic Reader – ILERP (KINDLE) project were described. The ILERP provides electronic readers (KINDLES) to seminary students in 2nd and 3rd world countries; it provides theological material and educational support to partner church seminaries and their continuing pastoral education programs around the world for free.



Rev. James Anthony, from Deer River, MN, talked about his work as an adjunct professor at the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Baguio City, Philippines. The Lutheran Church Philippines extended an invitation via CLEF allowing Rev. Anthony to teach for two weeks there. Session C – Debbie Larson

"Telling My Story"

Does the LWML have a brand like Discover, Allstate, Thrivent, Tide, Coke a Cola? How does a brand make you feel about that product or company? Everyone needs a good story. Deb's story "Give it Free!" We are all advocates for the LWML.

Where to begin – YOU + LWML = An Effective Story. Start with you. Describe yourself. Start by listing six adjectives that describe you. Then pick one to focus on! Effective stories have focus, are positively charged, are crafted, have a frame, and are practiced, list LWML's strengths, and demonstrate a high degree of trust and commitment.

She also talked about some of the weaknesses of the LWML: can be stuck on procedure, slow to change, decline in membership, and has a vision creep of no vision.

Debbie reminded us that at the national level the LWML is strong in the Word, and in services of mission and giving.
